### **Special Project Update**

#### School Focused Nursing Initiative Evaluation

OPHNL, in consultation with representatives from the Ministry of Health, Ministry of Education, Post-Secondary institutions and the Ontario Public Health Epidemiologist Network, conducted an evaluation of the School Focused Nurse Initiative. This evaluation documents lessons learned during the implementation of this program during the COVID-19 pandemic response. Based on the School Focused Nursing Initiative Evaluation, OPHNL has released recommendations which were received by the aLPHa Board of Directors on November 10, 2022. ## **Special Project Update**

#### Renewal of OPHNL Mission and Strategic Planning

At the OPHNL AGM held on June 20, 2022, members discussed the OPHNL mission. Attending members voted unanimously that the mission *"To promote and protect the health of Ontarians through excellence in public health nursing leadership"* still resonates with members and should form the basis of OPHNL strategic planning and work going forward.

#### Special Project Update Recovery Project

The OPHNL CNO Network Group initiated recovery planning in 2021. This began with a Health Unit Recovery Survey followed by facilitated discussions with Chief Nursing Officers to identify key areas of collaboration between health units. The information will be used to inform action and OPHNL strategic planning. The OPHNL Executive Committee and Chief Nursing Officers Network Group have begun initial strategic planning work, which will include a plan for engaging OPHNL members at the 2023 Fall OPHNL AGM.

## Special Project Update

Website and Membership and Training and Education

Public health leaders continue to experience a high volume of work as we reopen mandated public health programs and services. Two important special projects have been put on hold due to lack of capacity. These include (a) Updating the OPHNL Website and Increasing OPHNL Membership, and (b) Training and Education for OPHNL Members.

#### Strategic Plan Update Relationships



**Provincial Chief Nursing Officer:** The OPHNL Executive Committee and the OPHNL Chief Nursing Officers Network Group met with the Provincial Chief Nursing Officer in November 2022. The purpose of this meeting was to establish a relationship with Dr. Karima Velji with a goal that these groups will provide consultation related to public health nursing and possible solutions to health human resource issues. Dr. Velji has been tasked with the development of a health human resource strategy and capacity building plan with 10 year horizon for Ontario. During our meeting, Dr. Velji was direct, passionate, and inspiring with a strong call to action for nurses and nursing leaders to provide innovative solutions to the current pressures faced by the health care system. Dr. Velji has a strong interest in operationalizing lessons learned during COVID-19 response as it pertains to best practices, integrated models of care, and leveraging nurses to work at full scope of practice.

Association of Local Public Health Agencies: As an affiliate group, the President of OPHNL is on the alPHa Board of Directors and provides quarterly updates that can be found <u>here</u>. The OPHNL Executive Committee has been working with aLPHa to ensure alignment of messaging related to public health and public health nursing.

**Registered Nurses Association of Ontario:** In January 2023, OPHNL Executive Committee met with the RNAO to discuss the needs and perspectives of public health nursing in preparation for the RNAO pre-budget submission to the Province.

**Ontario Public Health Association:** As a Constituent Society member, OPHNL is represented on the OPHA Board of Directors and is participating in the OPHA Advocacy Committee.

## Strategic Plan Update Fostering a Highly Competent Workforce



Workforce planning was identified as a priority area for OPHNL during the pandemic recovery planning discussions. This will be topic will continue to be a consideration in OPHNL Strategic Planning moving forward.

In 2019 OPHNL endorsed the development of a national post-graduate program as an option for nurses seeking further education in public health nursing. This program officially launched in 2022 and runs through Mohawk College. For more information about the program see click <u>here</u>.

## Strategic Plan Update

Systems Level Impact

In follow up to meetings with the Provincial Chief Nursing Officer and RNAO, a small group of Chief Nursing Officers and OPHNL Executive Committee Members were brought together to develop products that represent a coordinated and consolidated voice from public health nursing leadership in Ontario.

The development of these documents occurred over the past several months and has involved consultations and feedback from the OPHNL Executive Committee, OPHNL CNO Network Group, Greater Toronto and Hamilton Area Medical Officers of Health, and the Association of Local Public Health Agencies.

In short, OPHNL recommends that the Provincial Government "increase and stabilize permanent funding for public health nurses to address service delivery backlogs and implement, innovative, convenient and easily accessible programs to promote health, prevent disease, and support the Province's identified priorities immediately and over the long term." It is OPHNL's position that with increased and stabilized permanent funding for PHN positions, public health units can flexibly respond to community needs.
